It took extensive soliciting to realize the \$5000 and it was presented to FOC at our 2009 reunion. The project never materialized and I began to request the refund of CUAAA money. Not everyone agreed with the idea to have the money refunded but so many of you did. Thank God we have the money back that not only CUAAA members donated through their dues but many associate members gave to the programs of CUAAA.

For those of you who do not know, Dr. Charles Richard Drew (1904-1950) was an African American physician, surgeon and medical researcher. A medical pioneer, Dr. Drew's research in the field of blood transfusions and techniques for blood storage resulted in the blood program still being used by the American Red Cross today.

In attendance were the presidents of Cuttington University, University of Liberia, and the Tubman University, Dr. Henrique F. Tokpa, Dr. Emmett Dennis, and Dr. Elizabeth Davis-Russell who was represented by the Rev. Rita Townsend because of health reason. Each president was introduced by the alumni association head or its designate. Dr. Henrique F. Tokpa was consequently introduced by the National Vice of Cuttington Alumni Association, Mr. Bobby Gborgar Joe, while Dr. Emmett Dennis was introduced by alumni President, Emmanuel Coleman. The Rev. Rita Elizabeth Davis-Russell was introduced by Mr. Edward Greenfield.

We're breaking ground week of November 6, 2010 for construction to begin on the new Allied Health Center at Cuttington. The program will be a part of the nursing college and focus on intermediate degrees (AA) in radiology, pharmacology among others. Along with classrooms, a 12-15 bed health center will be built. The clinic will provide services to Cuttington students, residents and the community. Cuttington has two or three graduates who are currently studying medicine in various countries. These doctors will return to staff the clinic and provide supervision to student nurses. All part of Cuttington's strategic plan to provide excellence in education.

In his opening remarks the president of Thrust '80 inc, Mr. Kwame Clement welcomed everyone and expressed gratitude for the generosity. In commenting on the formation of Thrust '80 Inc., he told the crowd that the organization was created to honor three fallen Liberian Heros, Charles Gbenyon, Nathaniel Kumeh, and John Victor, who all lost their lives as many other countless Liberians in the cause of the people.

Each president took turn to highlight some of their challenges and successes. For his part Dr. Henrique said that the work on the ground was such that every hand on deck was required to tackle many problems.

For his part, Dr. Emmett Dennis told the gathering that even though he had just had brain injury, he fought with his family to fly from Liberia to the program.

Rev. Rita Davis-Russell said that her President would have been there if she could. She then conveyed greetings from Dr. Elizabeth Davis-Russell who could not make it because of unavoidable circumstance.

The program was climaxed with the presentation of \$15,000 to the three schools with one scholarship each for Cuttington and Tubman universities while University of Liberia was awarded three schools. 😊
